The Finals Countdown

With only around a month to go of season 2011, a number of Fremantle teams still find themselves in the hunt for a finals spot. Please give them a cheer when you're on the sideline, it may be the little extra they need to get them over the line.

The Men's AHG league has been a pretty even affair all round this year, with only 9 points separating the top 7 teams. We currently sit in 6th spot, 1 point out of the qualifying 5 with 4 games to go. Our final games see us match up with OGMHC (11th), UWA (1st), Wolves (5th), Pirates (9th), so all is to play for and best of luck to the boys.

Our Women's AHG league team also find themselves with a slim chance for a finals berth, and currently occupy 7th spot, 2 points off 4th with 2 fixtures remaining. Results elsewhere will need to go our way, as well as gaining the maximum 6 points from Wolves (8th) & Vic Park (2nd).

The Men's 2's are already a shoe in for finals after a stellar season. Currently 2nd on the ladder, it would take a major disaster to halt their march. With 4 games to go they sit 14 points clear of 5th spot. Our Women's 2's are unfortunately out of the flag hunt for this season. As too are our Men's 3's, however, the Women's 3's are still knocking on the door. They currently occupy 4th spot, 2 points clear of UWA in 5th who have a game in hand. Some great results and a little bit of luck will be needed over the next 3 weeks to get them home.

The Women's 4's and 5's alas find themselves a little too far adrift of the leading pack in their respective divisions, but it's a different story for the Men's 4's.

With three rounds remaining we sit in third position, 2 points off top. 1 point is all that is required to guarantee finals hockey, however, a maximum 9 points from the last 3 rounds (against leaders CT Pirates and the bottom pair, UWA and Rockingham) would see us take out the minor premiership.

In the Metro grades there are also a few of our teams challenging for finals glory. Unfortunately Metro 1's in both Men's and Women's have struggled to find

form this season, hence miss out on finals in 2011, however, Men's Metro 2's sit third in a tight competition. Its that close even the bottom side still have a mathematical chance of making the final 4 in this 7 team league. They'll need to finish with some positive results from the final 3 fixtures against Mods (46th), OGMHC (6th) and Vic Park (1st) to ensure finals again this year.

Women's Metro 2's are confirmed for making a finals appearance this time around and currently lie 2nd, 1 point off the top. Wins in the remaining fixtures against John XXIII (3rd), Dellas (6th) and Vic Park (1st) would guarantee achieving the minor premiership.

Men's Metro 3's will need to knock off the 3 teams directly above them in 6th in order to have a slim chance of qualifying. And it's a similar story for the Men's Metro 4's who need to beat 3rd, 4th and the bottom side to have any chance of squeezing into 4th spot.

The Men's Masters 40's in their inaugural season are sitting pretty at the top of the ladder. It would be incredibly difficult for them not to be crowned minor premiers and a point from the last 3 rounds would guarantee that and finals hockey. Alas our Men's Masters 50's currently sit in 6th position and are unable to qualify for finals from their final 2 games.

The Men's midweek Masters are again this season dominating the grade and sit top of the ladder undefeated thus far. Irrespective of results in the final 2 games, they will be crowned minor premiers.

In the junior ranks the Boys "11/12 A Res" look set for finals after an excellent season, as to do the Boys "7/8 C". The Girls "11/12 A Res" currently sit 3rd with a strong chance of finishing in the top four, whilst the Girls "9/10 A Res" will need to finish strongly to sneak into the fourth spot from their position of 6th.

And finally, the Girls "7/8 B White" hold the lofty position of top spot after playing 11, winning 11 with a goal tally of 50 for and just 1 against! Now there's a season to be envious of!

FREMANTLE v MELVILLE

With Westside Wolves falling to YMCC this game presented both sides an opportunity to advance their finals aspirations. For the Magpies a win would see them move to fifth and a point clear of Wolves. Whilst for Melville win and they would move to sixth and only a point out of the top five.

It may have been that the high stakes got to the nerves of both sides as the opening moments were scrappy and errors were a plenty.

Melville City settled first and started to garner control. They mounted the first meaningful attack in the sixth minute when Evan Kelly passed to Jordan Hunt on the left who crossed but there was nobody there to take advantage and Fremantle survived.

Hunt, who at this stage was Melville's most threatening forward continued to present well and kept Fremantle defenders Darryl McCormick and Mark Nicholls alert.

The Magpies lack of possession forced them to look to score on the counter and a strong run by Phil Marshall saw him pass to Tim Boteler in the D who won a penalty corner. Fremantle didn't convert the opportunity and it almost worked against them. A quick Melville breakout leading to a chance for Hunt but Magpie 'keeper Jono Ellis was equal to the task and saved his team, not for the last time on the day. Minutes later Hunt was again denied by Ellis

With their dominance Melville were able to win a number of penalty corners but great running by McCormick supported by desperation of his fellow defenders backed up by some excellent saves denied Melville.

Not content with his defensive efforts McCormick tried to lift his side offensively. Late in the half he made a searching run from inside his own 25 to penetrate the Melville D. He tried to dish the ball off but Melville was just able to foil the attempt.

Melville continued to have the better of the half with

Pat Welsh, Justin McDougall and Maverick Yow supporting the efforts of Jordan Hunt.

For Fremantle all their better players were in defense with Jono Ellis having a standout game in goals.

The first half ended with the spectators hoping for an improvement in the second. Melville probably went to the break hoping that their failure to convert wouldn't come back to haunt them.

Fremantle significantly improved in the second half and started to show some of the midfield structure that



worked against Suburban the week before. With this came attacking opportunities.

Paul Nicholls gave Fremantle drive and energy whilst Phil Marshall, Ian McHuch and Jesse Dowsing started to enjoy possession.

Despite this Fremantle repeated Melville's failure to score. They won a number of penalty corners and had some threatening moments that required all of Tristan's Clements skills to save.

The highlight was from a Phil Marshall shot that seemed destined to hit the high in the corner but he flung himself to the right and deflected the ball to safety. Melville forwards struggled to gain traction as Fremantle pressed but the score remained unchanged.

The game finished in a dramatic manner. With a minute to go Melville won a penalty corner. Fremantle spectators watched on in dread. The push out was miss trapped by Mark Brodie but he managed to recover the ball and to get a shot away. This went wide and a quickly taken sixteen by Fremantle saw Phil Marshall with the ball on the half line with just seconds to go. He thumped the ball forward and it was deflected high in the air. Tim Boteler was in the Melville D for Fremantle and just managed to bring it down but as the ball bounced so high he couldn't get an effective shot in.

A tense and tight tussle had finished in a scoreless draw.

Magpies win priceless points

Men's AHG League / Round 18

FREMANTLE v HALE

With both sides one point behind fifth placed Wolves at the start of the round this fixture loomed as a season defining match for both sides. To add to the drama Wolves then beat Suburban – thus for the loser they would fall four points behind with only four games to go. A draw was Wolves preferred outcome.

The previous week Hale had booked a win whilst Fremantle had only dawn missing an opportunity to break back into the five. Form was on the defending champion's side.

As befitted such an important game the hockey was hard and uncompromising and the crowd was always on the edge of their seats. With so many stars away at AHL Fremantle's stocks were boosted by Phil Marshall and Ian McHugh, showing their commitment and catching the "red eye" to make it back to Perth after completing their commitments to the Tassie Tigers. Given the relative youth of the Fremantle side this could have been an important factor.

Hale started reasonably well and held a slight early ascendancy. Kit Tapper at centre half and Grant Patterson on the left were giving Hale drive. Magpie 'keeper Jono Ellis was soon called into action to make a clearance from an attack down the left then moments later Hale penetrated from the right but again Fremantle were able to scramble the ball clear. Kane Greenaway, Greg Young and Tom Cleghorn were making things tough for the Fremantle defense at this stage.

As the half progressed, the port side settled and started to give their young forwards enough ball to start to challenge the strong Hale defense led by Ross Meadows in goals.

Darryl McCormick after an uncertain beginning began to connect with Jesse Dowsing and Paul Nicholls to enable Fremantle to develop some drive down their right and it was from this source the opening goal was devised. McCormick passed to James McPherson who managed slip the ball down the line to Tim Boteler who ran hard at the D. Tackled at the top of the D the ball fell to Charlie Clifton who advanced the ball further. In the action that followed the ball fell to Paul Nicholls who scored from close range. Fremantle had the first goal in the 8th minute.

As good sides do, Hale tried to strike back immediately but the efforts of Justin Knapp, Greg Reece, Tom Cleghorn and other were repelled. Fremantle looked to

strike on the counter predominately down the right. Both sides had promising opportunities as the game ebbed and flowed but Fremantle clung to their one goal advantage.

Finally in the 34th minute Fremantle doubled their advantage. Not surprisingly Darryl McCormick was involved. Reviving the ball over the half line he made ground and fired in a powerful pass to Tom Boteler who



had doubled back into the D and trapped the ball back to goal. His back stick passed Jesse Dowsing and went straight to Steve Durrell who fired in a powerful shot on a reasonably tight angle to make it two nil in favour of the Magpies.

Hale attacked feverishly in the moments that remained in the first half but to no avail. Just minutes into the second half Fremantle's Jesse Dowsing, in his own half released a penetrating pass down the right touch line. Running on to it Tim Boteler collected it at about the "25" and penetrated the D. When trying to cut inside the cover defender, he fell but quickly recovered both his feet and the ball. He whipped the ball across the face of the goal where the ever reliable Charlie Clifton was on hand to convert from close range.

A desperately needed insurance goal for the port side is how it proved to be.

Hale showed their fighting qualities by striking back just moments later. In the 40th minute they won a penalty corner and an excellent drag flick was powered in by Geoff Cock. Hale were back in the game at 3-1 down with half an hour to play.

Hale now had momentum and created several near chances as Fremantle struggled to retain possession and it was no surprise when Hale scored again. An attack down the left saw Tom Cleghorn penetrate the D and with consummate skill fire a great shot that made it 3-2 with plenty of time on the clock.

The game now got really frantic as both sides sought to score. Both had penalty corner chances but each time the 'keepers were able to deny them. Hale's Greg Young hit

the side netting whilst for Fremantle Steve Durrell was unable to control a ball cut back from the base line when a clean trap could have given him a chance to shoot.

At one stage Tim Boteler thought he had given his side a precious fourth goal when the umpire first awarded the goal then to his and his team's chagrin reversed his decision and awarded a "16" instead.

All this led to a final dramatic conclusion. With eight seconds to go Fremantle captain and full back Mark Nicholls, who had had a fine game, thought he had made the game safe. He had won the ball deep in the corner on Hale's attacking right and progressed the ball forward to over the line past the "25" with only a few seconds to go.

Chris Lawson quickly took the free hit and to Fremantle's horror Tom Cleghorn collected it on the top of the D and as the final siren sounded was good enough to win his side a penalty corner.

Hale elected to have Tom Cleghorn inject the ball with Kit Tapper to trap. Fremantle's hopes soared when Darryl McCormick appeared to have run down the shot and the ball flew well out of the D. These hopes were dashed as the whistle blew and the umpire deemed it had struck his leg. The corner was to be retaken.

Again Jono Ellis and his cohorts were to face the music and keep their team's season alive. Whilst for Hale the pressure was no less great. The replayed attempt was almost a carbon copy of the first with the Darryl McCormick again running out but this time he got his stick to the ball and it deflected over the back line.

The game was over in the most dramatic fashion. Fremantle's season was alive while Hale faced an even tougher contract to defend their title. All players contributed to a tense, gripping and dramatic game that kept spectators on the edge of their seats.

As Wolves play both Fremantle and Hale over the last four rounds fifth spot is a long way from being decided. The situation becomes even more interesting as AHL and Kookaburras return to the AHG League and we can be sure there will be many more twists and turns before the qualifying rounds are completed.

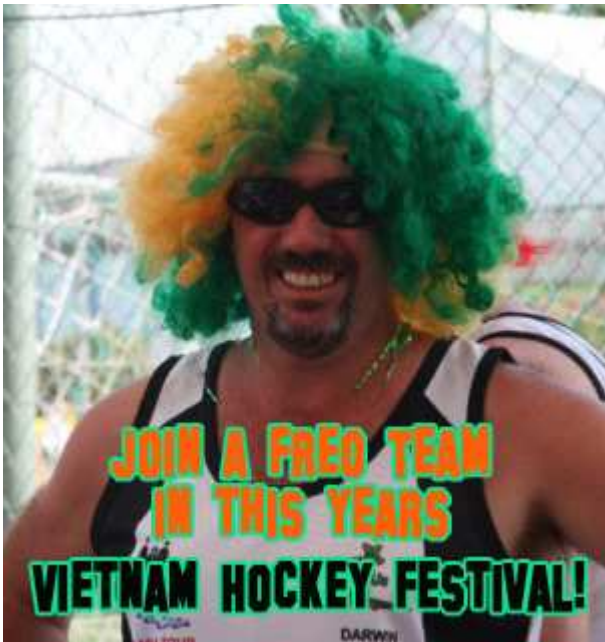
A mere minute later Eloise Crombie found herself in the same position as Turner, but her tomahawk missed wide into the sideboard.

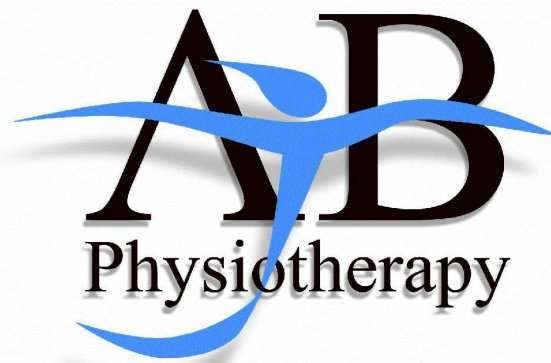

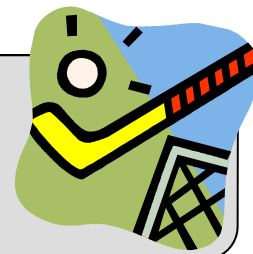

WA 2011 U21 Women's National Champions

**WA 1 defeat NSW
0 (0-0 half time)**

The Grand Final of the U21 Women's National Championships in Canberra was fought out between WA and NSW this afternoon. WA

had the momentum coming into this match as they were the only team to have defeated NSW during the round matches, but it was NSW who started the match strong.



NSW were dominating possession and cutting WA out of play with some great defensive work from Georgina Morgan. Morgan was also giving NSW a chance in attack with a drag flick on a penalty corner narrowly missing the goal.

WA appeared cornered by the NSW attack and were struggling to transfer the ball with any purpose.
